### TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mason in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mason on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at one of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following:

Article 1. Moderator for one year; Selectman for three years.

The polls to close at 7:30 P. M. of the same day and at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will allow the Tax Collector compensation for collecting State Head Tax and fix the amount at 8 per cent or take any action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$998.00 or any other sum for the purchase of ten tone operated house radio receivers for the Mason Volunteer Fire Department.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to become a member of the Nashua Regional Planning Agency and to see if the

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to include perpetual care in all future sales of cemetery lots. Cost to be \$300 per lot.

town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$85.00 (15c per capita) to finance studies to be conducted by the Regional Planning Agency.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to repeal the action taken at the Town Meeting of March 12, 1967, under Article 14 of the warrant. And that the election of Highway Agent be held at this meeting.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Highway Agent for three years.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As Mason enters a new decade there appears to be little relief from the increased cost of living. Our immediate concern is for our residents on fixed incomes.

The power line is coming along slowly and, hopefully, we will derive some income from this source that will help defray costs for the coming year.

We feel that good progress was made this year on our roads. The dirt roads were all graded this fall and we hope to continue this program yearly. The Duncan money was used to gravel and widen Nutting Hill Road and a section of Campbell Mill Road, which has been giving school bus problems. Jeds Lane and upper Hurricane Hill Road were also graveled with these funds. School Bus travel has been greatly improved with the one exception of the beginning of the Wilton Road, which should be taken care of by the State this coming year.

The Police and Fire Departments are keping up with the times, giving us increased protection. We would like to thank the many good citizens who give so much of their time for these departments. The fire house has taken on a new look which we can all be proud of. The Police Department has a new young member and has acquired some new equipment during the year.

We have several committees and borads which have vacancies this year. We would like to ask any interested residents to notify the Selectmen. The town government depends on these committees in order to function properly. This is a fine opportunity for one to take part in local affairs.

### REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Selectmen requested the services of the Financial Advisory Committee once during the year. The Committee met with the Selectmen to discuss the budget to be presented to the townspeople for 1970. The budget presents a discouraging picture in terms of continually increasing costs. In spite of the implications of the budget in terms of tax increases, there would appear to be few, if any, areas where significant reductions can be made.

A major portion of the increase in appropriations is caused by the radical increase in county taxes. This figure is not properly

a town expense, yet it must, by state law, be raised by taxation of local property. It is anticipated that the bill for Hillsborough County will be \$5,000 for 1970.

The Financial Advisory Committee has requested the Selectmen to present the analysis of the budget amounts and the expenditures in a way to help the townspeople understand the actual status of the town's accounts. In many cases there appears to be some confusion as to the amounts expended from town tax moneys instead of revenues from other sources.

The Financial Advisory Committee requests that the Selectmen consider seriously the repercussions of increasing the total assessed evaluation of the town. Increases in assessment will most likely increase the equalized evaluation of the town and this figure is used by several agencies in determining charges against the town and benefits due to it.

### REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The department had a busy year in 1969. We started the year with two serious house fires within a six day period in

February and another in June. Two of these buildings were of colonial origin and one was sub-standard construction which was built just before the adoption of the new Building Code. All buildings such as these propagate flame-spread very rapidly and were well involved when the department arrived.

On the other side is the department's slow response to alarms. At present all members are telephoned to inform them of an alarm of fire. This is extremely slow and results in delayed response. We are in the process of installing an air whistle on the fire station which will be blown by a radio tone from our communications center in Wilton.

I have also inserted a Warrant Article in the 1970 Warrant for ten tone-operated radio receivers. The balance of the money to purchase these radios will be contributed by the Volunteer Fire Department. We hope to get the rest of the radios in 1971. Th whistle and radios will allow much faster response than is now possible.

A good deal of additional equipment was added to the department this year, which makes fire ground operations much more effective. Members of the department attended fire schools in Guilford and Fitzwilliam this year as well as our own training meetings each month.

Within the next two or three years it will become necessary to ask the town for a new pumping engine. Our present pumper is a 1944 Seagrave, so it is 26 years old. While it is still working, its repair and upkeep as a first line piece of apparatus is mounting past the economical point. This will be an expensive undertaking, and thought to the financing should start now.

We still need additional members in the department. Those who think they would be interested may contact the chief or any department member. We meet the first and third Thursdays of each month.

My thanks to the department members and others who have given many hours of their time for the good of the department.

The department extends its thanks to the fire departments of Brookline, Townsend, Greenville, Wilton and New Ipswich for Mutual Aid assistance during the year.

### REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY

The major effort of the Mason Civil Defense Agency during the past year has been the development of plans for the town to use in the event of emergency. It is hoped that these can be accepted as official town policy or ordinance in the coming year.

Such plans are designed to provide a pre-planned set of procedures to follow in the case of natural or military disaster. It is anticipated that pre-planning can eliminate much of the confusion and resultant panic that can be caused in an unexpected emergency.

Continuing emphasis has been placed upon prompt and effective warning for the emergency personnel of the town. Money from the town CD budget has been invested in an additional radio transceiver and in materials for the audible alarm system.

The director wishes to take this opportunity to thank those

citizens who have aided the Civil Defense program during the past year. Anyone wishing to support the Mason Civil Defense Agency should speak to the Selectmen or the director.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking materials and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows:

### Fire Permit

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m.

### Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

### **Penalties**

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dopping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

### REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Clifton W. Hastings, Chairman; Donald A. Armington, Vice-Chairman; Edith Marshall and Ann Fifield, Members.

In 1969 there were meetings on the first Monday of each month, except in July, August and September.

The Conservation Commission organized and conducted a good Spring Clean-up Day. Nearly all Mason roads were rid of trash and litter. Both young and old worked hard and did a very good job, and the Commission should here make mention of its gratitude to those who gave their time.

The Mason Conservation Commission sent one youngster to the Conservation Camp at Bear Brook State Park. The Commission feels that this was a successful educational experiment, and wishes to thank those involved.

Fifteen white birch trees were planted at the Jefts Lot across from Wolf Rock. Thanks to Carl Valyou for spotting the exact boundaries of our new lot.

Two Conservation pamphlets will soon be made available to individuals. One is directed at sportsmen, requesting their help in protecting private property. The other is directed at landowners, asking for information on hunting and fishing infractions.

The Commission, in the coming year, will welcome at its-meetings anyone with a conservation problem or with interest in conservation.

### REPORT OF THE WELFARE OFFICER

Under the direction of the Selectmen, Mason's Welfare Officer assists residents in benefiting from relief programs under Federal, State, County, Community, Town and private direction.

Most Federal, State and County assistance centers in Nashua, while Veteran's Aid is located in Manchester. The District Nursing Association is located at Peterborough Hospital, with Vocational Rehabilitation and Senior Citizens Services available at Keene addresses.

Mason limits itself to the expenses of its Welfare Officer and minor emergency assistance. On a "friendly neighbor" basis help is extended to victims of house fires and other emergencies. We have fortunately had but one house fire in recent months compared with five in the winter of 1968-69.

Enrollment in the Surplus Food Distribution program under the U.S. Department of Agriculture has dropped fifty percent during the year, probably reflecting higher wage scales. Eligibility for the monthly distribution of food from the Town Hall will be gladly studied and determined if the Welfare Officer or a Selectman is notified.

The Welfare Officer is the successor trustee of a fund established in 1938 by Martha L. Jones, a former school teacher in Mason and Townsend. Its proceeds are available for the assistance of a limited number of "worthy and needy" individuals or families in times of emergency.
